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MUSEUM REACHES OUT TO NEIGHBORS WITH THIRD CELEBRATE MICRONESIA FESTIVAL MARCH 19

HONOLULU, HAWAI'I (March 4, 2016)—In an effort to reach out to one of its neighbor communities, the Honolulu Museum of Art launched its annual Celebrate Micronesia Festival in March 2014. In 2015, the festival almost doubled in size and scope.

This year guests can expect another relaxed, activity-filled family day showcasing the traditional music, dance, crafts, and fashions of the many island cultures that make up Micronesia.

"Working with English Language Learner students from Queen Ka'ahumanu Elementary School and McKinley High School, we realized that there are many Micronesian students who live and or go to school near the museum, yet never came here with their families," says Vince Hazen, director of the Honolulu Museum of Art School. "The museum was founded by Anna Rice Cooke to celebrate the many cultures that make up Hawai'i—we want to continue the tradition by highlighting the rich traditions of the islands' newest immigrants."

Groups such as the Marshallese Women's Club, and its offshoot dance group Lale Dron, the Palauan dance troupe Mem Doloik, the Remathau Women's Group, and, coming all the way from Hawai'I Island, Lien Pohnpei, will offer music and dance performances, and booths showing off traditional crafts and clothing.

Christopher Caravalho—the writer, penciller and inker of Mana Comics—has drawn inspiration from Micronesian folklore to create a team of superheroes that he will debut at

Children can color photocopies of black-and-white drawings of Caravalho's characters. At a drawing station, kids can also create their own Micronesian superhero.

On view during the festival are two exhibitions—*Arc: Charting the Path of Celestial Bodies,* an installation spearheaded by Māori visual and performing artist Moana Nepia that addresses navigation and emigration.
